may complete the <u>2020-21 Typed Option</u> Form. Please complete Section 1 of the form and return it to the District Office, beginning September 3, between the hours of 7:30am and 3:30pm. You may also scan the form to bhuls@ginorthwest.org anytime after September 1. If your child currently attends one of the Northwest schools, their option will continue on through high school.

Please share this information with friends, family or neighbors who may be interested in opting into the NW school district. For the 2020-2021 school year:

- The first day to turn in option paperwork for the 2020-2021 school year is September 1, 2019.
- As September 1, 2019 is a Sunday, the next business day the District Office is open is Tuesday, September 3, 2019.
- Beginning Sunday, September 1, option paperwork may be emailed to bhuls@ginorthwest.org or paperwork may be dropped off at the District Office (located at the high school) on Tuesday, September 3, 2019, between 7:30 am and 3:30 pm.
- Option forms will **NOT** be accepted at the elementary sites.
- Requests submitted by 3:30 pm on Tuesday, September 3, 2019 (either dropped off or via email) will be placed into a lottery system for acceptance.
- Requests will be approved based on capacity at each grade level and building site.
- Building site placement will be determined by lottery order and capacity limits.

Freshmen Academy

Hello to the graduating class of 2023 and our newest Vikings in the building. The 2019-2020 school year is underway. I still cannot believe that I am entering my 25th year in the education profession. There is nothing better than the first day of school when all of the kids return. It was great to see all of the new freshmen show up for



orientation on August 14th with new clothes, new shoes and new hairdos. We have an awesome group of new freshmen here at Northwest. We are very excited to start another year and to work with your child(ren) each and every day. Since this is the fifth year for the Freshmen Academy, we want to keep working to make it better each and every year. It was so much fun to talk with the freshmen during the orientation and to see them get to know each other through opportunities built into the presentation. If you have any suggestions to make the orientation better for next year, please do not hesitate to contact me.

I know that most of the class received their Chromebook within a week of school starting, but if your child has not received theirs yet it is due to the Chromebook fee not being paid or that a parent did not attend one of the Chromebook bootcamp sessions. Please contact me for help with either one of these issues. These devices allow our students to stay current with technology and help them to learn at any hour and day of the week. Be sure to talk with your children at home about internet safety, check that they have their Chromebook with them before heading to school and that the Chromebook is sufficiently charged each and every night.

The freshmen have most of their core classes (English, Math, Science & Social Studies) during periods 3-6 (9:32 - 2:00). We understand that it is impossible to always schedule doctor's appointments around these times but if it is at all possible, please try to do so. When your child does miss school, be sure to call the main office so they can mark their attendance correctly. After five absences to any class in a semester, a parent will receive a letter from the school, regardless if they are excused absences or not. This is in accordance with state statute while also allowing us to effectively communicate with parents. If your child is late to a class (tardy) four times, they will owe a detention for that teacher. Please call or email me to discuss any attendance questions you might have.

During the first month of school, the freshmen will be given MAPS tests. Students just began to take these tests in Reading, Language and Math. These tests are norm referenced tests which help our district to place children in the appropriate level class. These tests also help us to show how our students compare nationally to other kids, along with giving us data to show if there is yearly growth. These tests are given in late August / early September and then again at the end of the year in April / May. Some of the freshmen may have had their Math class adjusted, depending on how they score on this test. We will be sure to call parents if that is the case.

We will again run an after-school study hall for freshmen. This will be available on M, T, Th & F from 3:40 - 4:10 each of those days. This is staffed by a different academy teacher each week, and I make sure that I help cover this study hall from time to time too. The study hall is there as a support for students who may not be able to get answers from home or just a quiet place to get assignments done so they won't have homework. Students can be assigned to attend this study hall as a consequence though if they are not getting work done. If your child does need to stay after school on Wednesday nights, there is a study hall provided by the school due to the early dismissal each Wednesday.

As I conclude my newsletter, I want to make sure that all parents know how to get ahold of me. Parent Notice Concerning Disclosure of Student Recruiting Information

The No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 requires Northwest High School to provide military recruiters and institution of higher education access to secondary school students' names, addresses, and telephone listings. Parents and secondary students have the right to request that Northwest High School not provide this information (i.e., not provide the student's name, address and



telephone listing) to military recruiters or institutions of higher education, without their prior written parental

consent. Northwest High School will comply with any such request. Parents and students wishing to deny release of information to military recruiters or institutions of higher education may do so by notifying the school's Central Office in writing.

Family Educational Rights & Privacy Act Notice for Directory Information

The Family Educational Rights & Privacy Act (FERPA), a federal law, requires that Northwest High School, with certain exceptions, obtain your written consent prior to the disclosure of personally

identifiable information from your child's education records.

However, Northwest High School may disclose appropriately designated "directory information" without written consent, unless you have advised the district to the contrary in accordance with district procedures. The primary purpose of directory information is to allow the Northwest High School to include this type of information from your child's education records in certain school publications. Examples include: A playbill, showing your students role in a drama production; Annual yearbook; Honor roll or other recognition lists; Graduation programs; Sports programs such as for wrestling, showing weight & height of team members.

Directory information, which is information that is generally not considered harmful or an invasion of privacy, can also be disclosed to outside organizations without a parent's prior written consent. Outside organizations include, but are not limited to, companies that manufacture class rings or publish yearbooks. In addition, two federal laws require public schools receiving assistance under the Elementary & Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) to provide military recruiters, upon request, with three directory information categories - names, addresses and telephone listings unless parents have advised the public school that they do not want their student's information disclosed without their prior written consent. If you do not want Northwest High School to disclose directory information from your child's education records without your prior written consent, you must notify the school's Central Office in writing by the end of the first week of the first semester, or for new students, within the first week of enrollment. Northwest High School has designated the following information as directory information:

Student's name; address; telephone listing; electronic mail address; photograph; date & place of birth; major field of study; dates of attendance; grade level; participation in officially recognized activities and sports; weight and height of members of athletic teams; degrees, honors, and awards received; the most recent education agency or institution attended. ��
